

Basic tips for composition

- Use the rule of thirds, with some exceptions
- Keep horizons straight
- Choose which verticals you want straight.
- Leave space in front of objects especially when they are moving.
- Put denser objects below, lighter on top.



Rule of thirds - place objects of interests near the intersections





















If a single blossom doesn't fill the frame, offset it a bit.










Telling a good story

- Re-order pics if it tells a better tale






Adding a touch of humour


- Don't embarrass anyone






Don't be afraid to experiment with unlikely subjects


Placing people into your photos



Don't be afraid of strangers! BUT:

- Keep your distance, be careful zooming, especially with kids.
- Try to stick to no faces or hard-to-see faces.
- Take a shot and move on.
- Be selective in what you post, especially if your camera's has a gps.
- For foreign cultures, be fast, buy something small. They will help you get a great shot.
- Take an interest in their craft/activity.






















Position people well - take lots of shots!

The eye find the person even if they are almost out of the shot; humans like to look at other humans.






- More forgiving of negative space












Sunrise...Sunset

It is okay to put the sun in the middle










The sky doesn't have to be red

Pay attention to colour choices



Sometimes colour is an important element

Consider monochrome



Distracting colours



The person going the opposite way suddenly becomes much more noticeable



Jarring colours may not match the mood you want



Try masking and desaturating the colours



Or try black and white















Too many competing colours?



Road shots - try not to zoom unless the car/bus is stopped







Remember not to zoom if vehicle is moving







Shots that would be missed if not taken from bus or car






The challenge of wildlife

Backlighting means dark faces but people will forgive this because they are horses!












Grab opportunities





Take lots of pictures

- Carry spare batteries so you get all the shots
- Don't show all the pics you take, cull and re-order
- ▶ 100 photos can be viewed in 10 mins if you give about 5 secs per photo.
- If you have more than 100, set up separate albums or in-person sessions.
- Don't try to make every shot a perfect picture – think about the story!

You miss 100% of the shots you don't take!
